

This week's Information: *The Olympic Games*



### OLYMPICS IN JAPAN & AUSTRALIA

- 1940 TOKYO - cancelled
- SAPPORO - Winter Olympics - cancelled
- 1956 MELBOURNE - first Olympics to be hosted in the southern hemisphere
- 1964 TOKYO - hosted Asia's first Olympics
- 1972 SAPPORO - hosted Asia's first Winter Olympics
- 1998 NAGANO - hosted Winter Olympics
- 2000 SYDNEY - hosted Olympics
- 2020 TOKYO - postponed
- 2021 TOKYO - Tokyo 2020 (remains official name) due next month
- 2032 BRISBANE - to be announced on the eve of Tokyo 2020!

In Ancient Greece, Iphitos, the king of the city-state of Elis, asked the oracle of Delphi what should be done to save Greece from wars and epidemics. He was told to create a peaceful sporting competition that would become the Ancient Olympic Games (776BCE – 393CE, held 293 times!).

This legend says the primary purpose of the Olympics is to re-unite humanity to stamp out wars and fight against epidemics. In 1894, Baron Pierre de Coubertin founded the International

Olympic Committee which led to the first modern Games in Athens in 1896.

Unfortunately, the 1916 Berlin Games, the 1940 Tokyo Games, (then awarded to Helsinki) and 1944 London Games were all cancelled due to the outbreak of war. The Tokyo 2020 Games were postponed due to COVID 19, the first in a long Olympic history to be cancelled by an epidemic - even when the Spanish flu hit (1918 to 1920) and infected about a third of the world's population at the time. The death toll was estimated to have been somewhere between 20 - 50 million, making it one of the deadliest pandemics in human history. Amazingly, in 1920, during this dreadful pandemic and while still suffering significantly from destruction caused by WW I (ending in 1918), the Summer Olympics was successfully held in Antwerp, Belgium. *Wow!!*

Considering the origin of the Olympics, linking the holding of games with 'reconstruction or recovery from war or disaster' can be considered as returning to its roots and why it was originally created. The 1940 Tokyo Games which was not held due to the outbreak of World War II were intended to showcase the country's recovery from the 1923 Great Kanto Earthquake where more than 100,000 people perished. Similarly, the 1964 Summer Games were held to show how Japan had risen from the ashes of World War II. Japan's efforts to host the Olympics in Tokyo over the years have been closely tied to the concept of recovery from catastrophic events. The government has dubbed the 2020 Tokyo Games the "Reconstruction Olympics" referring to the country's recovery following the 2011 earthquake, tsunami, and nuclear disaster.

Coincidentally, the World Health Organization (WHO) classed the spread of COVID-19 as a pandemic on March 11 - the same day the massive quake hit Japan a decade before. The "Reconstruction Olympics" represents not only Japan's recovery from the 2011 disaster but also the world's recovery from the pandemic. Recovery now has a double meaning. The Ancient Olympics gave people a sense of unity that games would bear a strong message that humanity is united in confronting the challenges that threaten its very existence. I personally believe that 2020 Tokyo Olympics, which have been shrouded by uncertainty due to the coronavirus pandemic, should be held because the games themselves sprang from the very idea of overcoming wars and epidemics. With fewer or no spectators at all, the most important point is to go ahead and hold the Olympics to show that the pandemic has not defeated humanity.

Back to CLG - In my Japanese program, students, mainly in years 4 and 5 will learn about the Olympics in term 2 & 3. Finally, I would like to conclude this article with....



Sleep researchers are investigating whether brief sleep education can improve children's sleep.


**Participation for your child will involve:**

- Learn about their sleep through a home-based PSG recording (measures depth of sleep) before and after education sessions.



## Head lice – did you know?



- Head lice **DO NOT** fly, jump, hop or swim – they spread from head to head contact.
- Head lice live on human heads, **NOT** on animals, carpets or furniture.
- They love **ALL** hair colour and **ALL** hair types including fine, thick, curly, straight, clean **AND** dirty.
- Adults are called lice, their eggs are called nits. Lice can live for up to **5 WEEKS!**
- A single treatment for head lice will **NOT** kill **ALL** nits (eggs).
- Head lice **DO NOT** prefer a particular blood group.
- The wet combing method is an **EFFECTIVE** treatment.
- Head lice **DON'T** carry disease, but scratching the scalp can cause bacterial infections if the skin breaks.
- You can get head lice again! Successful treatment does **NOT** stop head lice from coming back later.

## How to get rid of head lice using the wet combing technique

Use this method to check for and treat head lice

**5 things you will need:**

- hair conditioner
- a wide toothed comb
- a fine long toothed head lice comb
- bright light or sunlight
- tissues or paper towel.

**20 Minutes**  
Conditioner stuns head lice for around 20 minutes and makes hair slippery, making it easier to remove lice from the head.



**7 steps to remove head lice:**  
Work quickly as the effect of the conditioner starts to wear off after about 20 minutes.

<b>Step 1</b> Generously apply conditioner to dry hair to cover the full length of the hair.	<b>Step 2</b> Untangle the hair with a wide-toothed comb.	<b>Step 3</b> Put the fine-toothed head lice comb flat against the scalp and draw the comb through each section of hair from the roots to the ends.	<b>Step 4</b> Wipe the comb after each stroke onto white tissue or paper towel, checking each time for head lice and nits.	<b>Step 5</b> Comb each section of hair at least 5 times.	<b>Step 6</b> Wash the hair as normal.	<b>Step 7</b> Scrub the comb with an old toothbrush to remove any eggs or lice that may be present.
---	--	--	---	--	---	--

**REPEAT.** If you find live head lice, repeat steps 1-7 every 2 days until no lice have been found for 10 days.


